Area Facilities 'Meeting' the Need

Jackson County features several facilities to accommodate receptions, meetings and conferences large or small, indoors or outside.

Here's a synopsis of sites that are available.

Cedar Lakes Conference Center

This facility is a popular destination for meetings, retreats and workshops.



Jackson County Offers Abundant Outdoor Options

You don't need to travel far to get away from it all. For those who have a passion for fishing, the Ripley area has more than 10 stocked lakes in addition to several streams. Those who enjoy hunting will like the fact that Jackson County consistently ranks among West Virginia's deer and turkey harvest leaders.

The Mill Creek Water Trail offers more than 20 miles for kayaking. More than a dozen hiking trails are located across Jackson County.

Fishing

The Mill Creek Watershed Project led to the creation of an angler's paradise in the Ripley area. Elk Fork Lake, for instance, features 278 acres of fishing with a significant amount of standing timber and low

water marshes.

Other popular spots include Rollins Lake, a 40-acre site situated just three miles off Exit 138 of Interstate 77. O'Brien Lake is a 217-acre site located near the community of Statts Mill. Woodrum Lake in Southern Jackson County covers 240 acres with 18 miles of shoreline.

Hunting

Jackson County features public hunting areas at the Woodrum Lake Wildlife Management area near Kenna and the Frozen Camp Wildlife Management Area, east of Ripley.



The hunting area at Woodrum includes more than 1,800 acres of land with deer, grouse, rabbit, squirrel, turkey and waterfowl.

Frozen Camp's WMA features a 200-yard rifle range and game such as deer, grouse, rabbit, squirrel, turkey and waterfowl.

Hog Haven is a 200 acre game preserve located near Kenna. Hunting experiences include 5 ram varieties and hogs weighing up to 300 lbs.

Trophy Whitetails is a 600 acre whitetail preserve paradise located in Goldtown. A legendary and epic experience is what all hunters should expect in a guided whitetail preserve hunt.

Mill Creek Water Trail

The 22-mile Mill Creek Water Trail is growing in popularity among those who like to kayak or canoe. The course extends from the Ohio River at Millwood, beyond the Jackson



County Fairgrounds at Cottageville, Rol-

lins Lake at Evans and ends at Cedar Lakes Conference Center, south of Ripley.

The sections that are most easy to navigate are situated between the put-in locations at Rollins Lake, the Jackson County Fairgrounds and the river.

Hiking





Days of Yore Remembered in Ripley

America's Civil War is sometimes referred to as the Blue and Gray. Perhaps as much as any place in the country, the Blue and Gray lived side-by-side in Jackson County.

While there were no major battles here, the story of the daily, tumultuous struggle is told on the Civil War Trail markers of the community.

Three of the markers are situated in Jackson County. Riverfront Park in Ravenswood was the site of the Jenkins Raid crossing into Ohio. Another Civil War Trail sign is located at Cedar Lakes Conference Center. "The Casto Hole" offers a poetic perspective of the conflict between friends on opposite sides of the war.

The picturesque Jackson County Courthouse Square features a Civil War statue, and two small cannons of the era. A veteran's memorial dedicated to those who made the ultimate sacrifice for our country occupies one corner of the square.

An historical marker describes the trial leading to the last public execution in West Virginia in 1897.

A decorative bench explains how the town is named for Harry Ripley, a circuit riding, saddleback preacher who tragically died in 1830 with his marriage certificate in his coat pocket.

Nearby North Street is known for its architecture. It features two stately homes that are included on the National Register of Historical Places.

Seventeen covered bridges remain in West Virginia. Two of them are situated within 10 miles of Ripley. Located near Route 21 at Sandyville, the Sarvis Fork Covered Bridge is still used by vehicular traffic. The Statts Mill Covered Bridge is a focal point for countless photographers. The 1887 span was preserved and relocated at Cedar Lakes. A walk through the bridge will lead visitors to Heritage House, a furnished pioneer cabin, and the Old Field House, a one-room school.







It's a Year-Round Crafty Experience

Cedar Lakes Conference Center not only serves as the home of the Mountain State Art & Craft Fair, it also has a year-round schedule of craft-related workshops.

More than 70 weekend and week-long workshops are planned annually. Cedar Lakes is affiliated with the international Road Scholar lifelong learning program. The recent craft season attracted workshop attendees from 42 states and three countries.

Topics range from furniture making and salt risin' bread to blacksmithing and the art of fly fishing. Musical workshops are offered on the old time fiddle and dulcimer. Those who want to work with metal may enjoy the tinsmith, steel knife or fabricating with silver classes. Traditional Appalachian craft topics such as basketry, quilting and woodcarving are staples of the program. It also ventures into the uncommon crafts of scrimshaw (engraving), seaform with cabochon (weaving with beads), carolingian (miniscule script letters), marquetry and parquetry (wood inlay).

The craft program attracts national-level instructors from West Virginia and beyond.

Cedar Lakes Conference Center offers meals and hotel lodging with the craft program. Commuting to



the workshops is another option for those who reside in the area.

The WV Artisan Market, throughout the year, offers evening and weekend events. Ranging from belly dancing to ornament making. These are open to the public but registration may be required.

Another hands-on art opportunity is with Art by Karen Wolfe. The local studio offers a step by step creative experience for kids and adults. Details can be found at artbykarenwolfe.com. "We have been attending three or four of the work-shops each year since 1999. The instructors are great. They have taken me from a beginning quilter to an almost advanced quilter. It's a relaxing time to work on a craft without interruptions."
